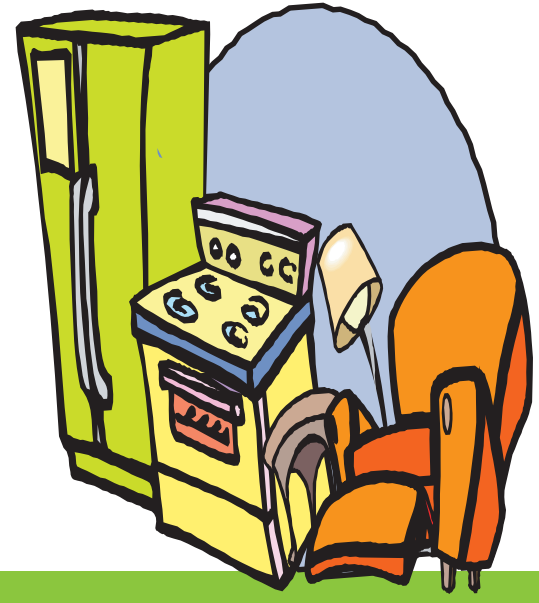

Chino Hills Disposal offers residents FREE pickup for household items like sofas, stoves, washers and dryers that are too large to put in the regular trash containers. Single family residents receive up to three pickups per calendar year, at no charge. Call (866) 238-2444 for more information and/or to schedule a bulky item collection at your home. Please be prepared to list items. Weight limit may not exceed 125 pounds and there is a small fee for refrigerators, freezers and air conditioners.

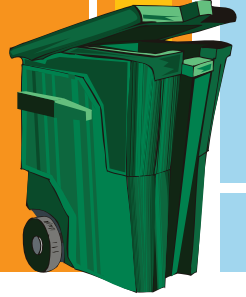

Recycle For The Next Generation

The residents of Chino Hills are coming through in a big way for the next generation and for the City by continuing to reduce and recycle over half of their solid waste. Recycling allows the City to comply with the State's strict recycling laws which require cities to reduce their waste by 50 percent or pay steep fines.

Recycling is critical because it not only allows the City to recycle many types and quantities of recyclable items and yard waste, instead of dumping them in the landfill, but also because it allows industry to reduce the amount of raw materials used in production of goods. By using recyclable materials, manufacturing also consumes less energy than is needed to produce the same goods using raw materials. As a result, the amount of air pollution and toxins released into our environment is reduced. Another benefit of recycling is that when we reduce the amount of trash sent to the landfill, we help the City of Chino Hills minimize the impact of rising landfill rates.

TIPS TO REDUCE

- ◆ Give unwanted items to charity
- ◆ Buy in bulk
- ◆ Use cloth shopping bags instead of paper or plastic
- ◆ Use reusable containers for leftovers
- ◆ Use cloth napkins and towels
- ◆ E-mail instead of using paper

Universal Waste Fluorescent Lamps Q&A

Q. Do I need to recycle my fluorescent lamps?

A. YES! All fluorescent lamps contain a hazardous substance called mercury. When lamps break in the landfill the mercury vaporizes and comes back down in rain water; contaminating our water and the food we eat. Scientists are finding an increased level of mercury in the fish we eat. Consumption of fish by expectant mothers can transfer dangerous levels of mercury to unborn children; causing neurological impairments.

Q. Where can I recycle fluorescent lamps?

A. Household residents can take lamps and tubes to the San Bernardino County HHW Collection Center located at the Chino City Public Works Center, 5050 Schaefer Avenue, Chino. The collection center is open the 2nd and 4th Saturday of the month from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m.

Ewaste is a popular term for electronic products nearing the end of their useful life. Computers, televisions, VCRs, stereos, copiers, and fax machines are common electronic products. Electronic discards are one of the fastest growing segments of our nation's waste stream. Under current regulation, these devices require special handling and can no longer be disposed of in landfills.

Your collection will be delayed by one day if your collection falls on or after one of these holidays: Christmas, New Year's Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day and Thanksgiving Day.

Recycle Your Christmas Tree | Dec. 31st - Jan. 11th

Give "Mother Earth" a gift this year by recycling your Christmas tree. It is easy...just cut your tree up and place it in your **BLACK** yard waste container or place it at the curb on your regular collection day from December 31st thru January 11th. Trees larger than six feet must be cut in half. Please remove stand and all decorations.

What Goes Where?

PROPER SORTING HELPS THE CITY REACH RECYCLING GOALS

Chino Hills Recycles automated waste collection and recycling program help control the volume of waste dumped into landfills. Residents receive three 100 gallon containers; a **GRAY** container for recyclables, a **BLACK** container for yard waste and a **GREEN** container for trash. You can avoid making common sorting mistakes, like bagging yard waste, by reading and following these simple sorting guidelines:

Yard Waste – Black Container

For residents with the yard waste program in their area – all material must be loose, and not bagged.

- Grass
- Leaves
- Prunings (no palm fronds)
- Twigs/branches (four inches in diameter; three feet in length)
- Weeds
